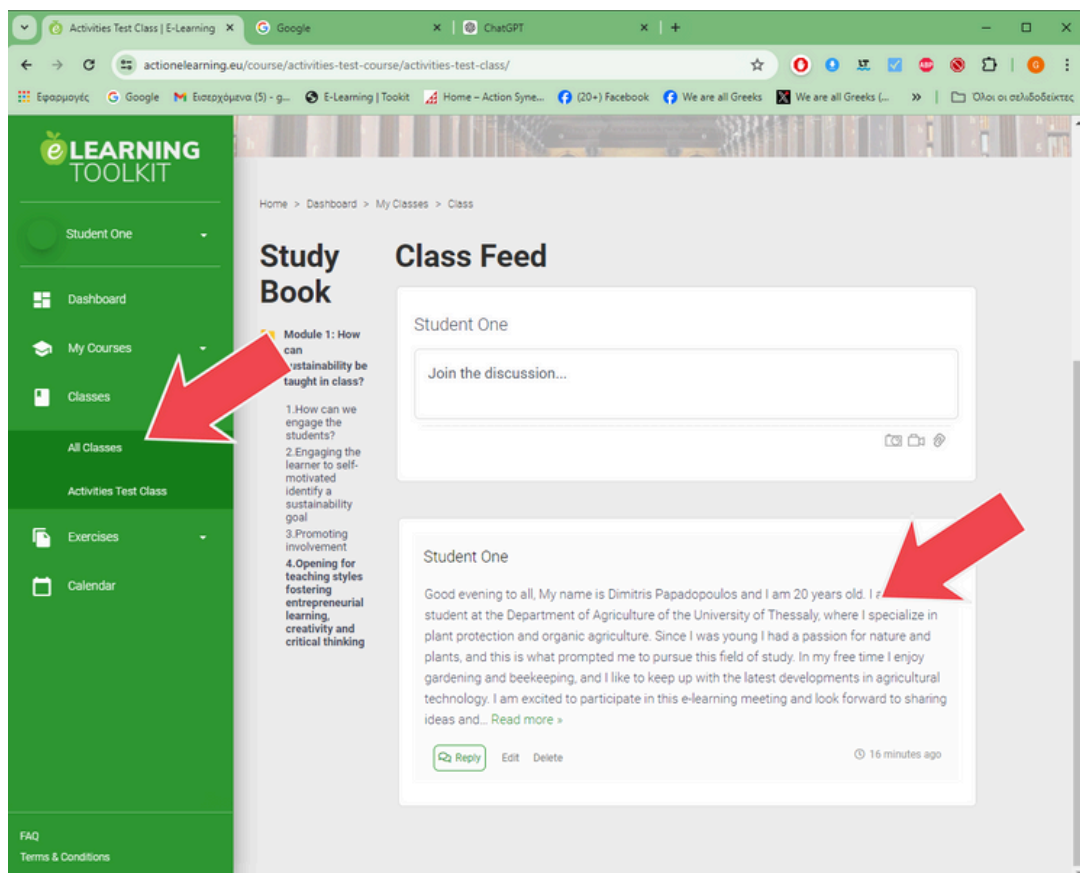

The e-learning Class

The most important aspect of an e-learning course is its interactivity, this is what distinguishes it from a simple text posted on the Internet.

The e-learning toolkit places great emphasis on interactivity, i.e. communication between the teacher and the students throughout the course.

To enter the Class, select Class, All Classes from the green menu bar on the left and click on the icon of the course you have chosen.



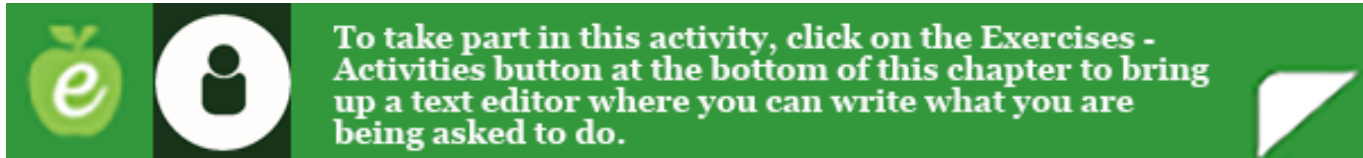
The class is divided into two parts, the study book and the activity feed, in the study book there are the lessons that are in the courses, with one difference, there are only the lessons for which there is an activity.

For example, if the course has 5 modules and the Activity is for module 2, in the Study Book you will only see the chapters of module 2, this is for the convenience of the student so that they don't have to go back and forth from the class to the course and instead if they want to see some additional columns.

Levels of Interactivity

1. Individual activities

The individual activities are the first level of interactivity, the first level is for individual activities, these are activities that are for each individual learner, when these activities are present you will see this green bar in the text.




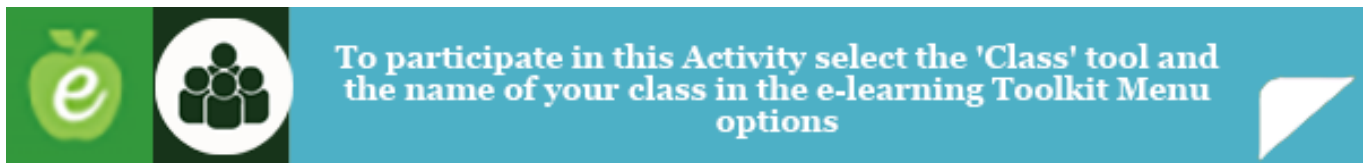
By clicking on the appropriate icon the learner interacts as follows.

2. Class Activities

The second level is for the whole class, class activities, at this level all the students interact with the teacher, when these activities are present you will see this blue bar in the text

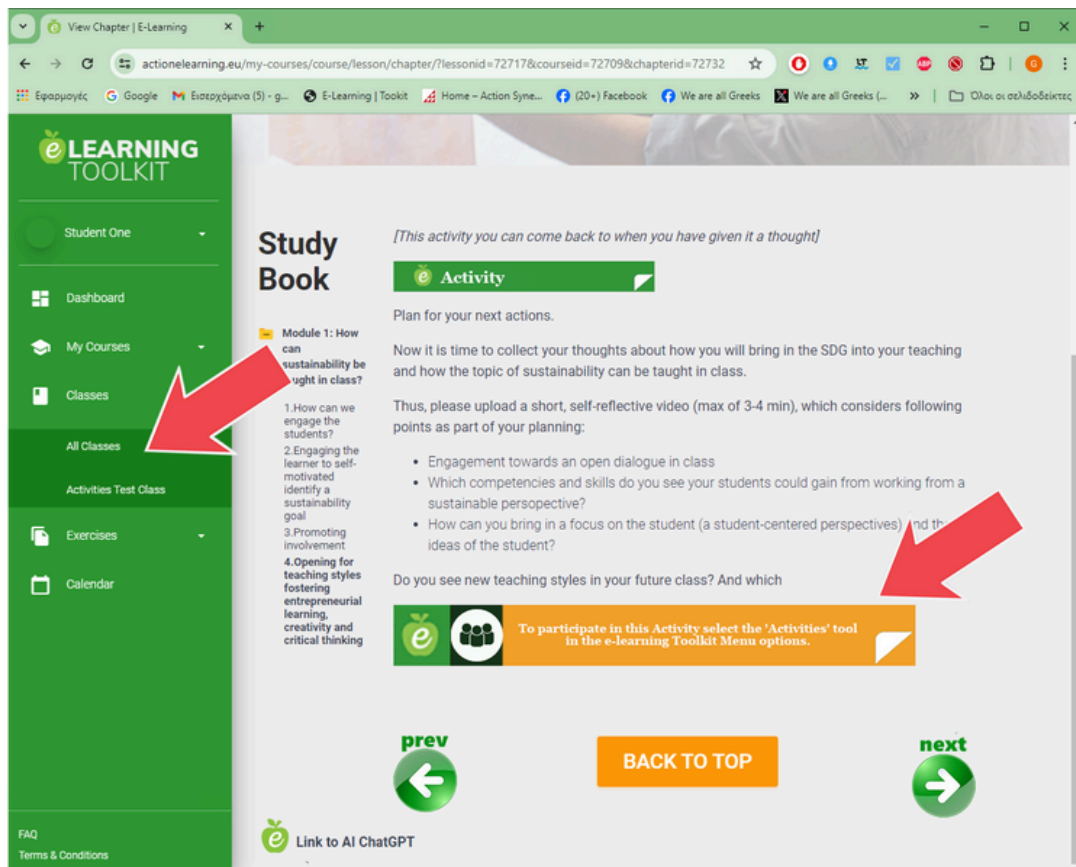
By selecting class, all classes and the course icon you will be taken to the class feed where in forum format you can interact with the teacher and all the students with text or media as you wish.

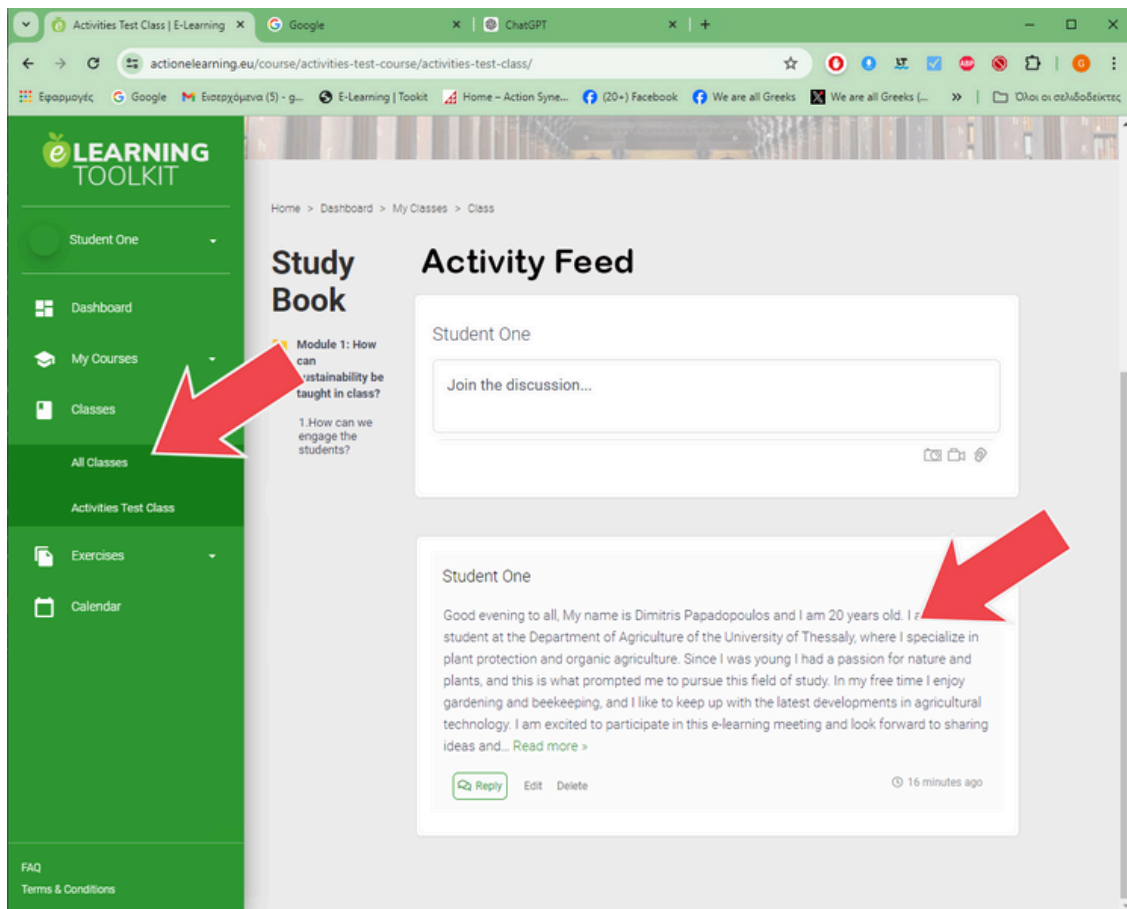
Levels of Interactivity

3.Group Activities

The third level is for Group Activities, this level gives the teacher the ability to divide the students into groups and assign them a task or activity in groups, these activities are marked in the text with an orange bar and by selecting Classes, Activities and the name of the activity.



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All Activities are done in the Class and not in the Course which acts as the Study Book, why?

Because the e-learning toolkit gives the teacher a detailed report on the progress of all activities in the class.
